# Annotated Bibliography

**ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY #1:** Yablonsky, L. *The Hippie Trip*. 1968.

**Summary:** The main idea about this source is that it revolves around the culture, appropriation, and insight from the 60's. The 60's played a relatively large part in the revival of colors and played a huge inspiration for the 80's, more so than the 50's or 70's. It covers what the culture was like in this time, in a dual-noted biography of Lewis Yablonsky. Yablonsky combines an extensive, coherent report on hippie life with a thorough look at the movement in relation to the wider societal issues of the time. Topics covered are Societal needs and accomplishments, Diversity and how it influenced the culture more, and lastly, Color appropriation and how hippies had a way of turning dull into color, and that is the view of how I chose to do my Senior Mastery.

**Assessment:** This source was incredibly helpful in helping me determine the underlying factors of the book itself. I found a lot of resources showing how "hippies" in that time chose to live in color and away from societal issues.

**Reflection:** This fits into my research, as stated above, by showing how hippies in the 60's lived in full, aspiring color. They consumed drugs in this time away from societal beings, so in sense,

they did it even though it was illegal, and was able to get a clearer view, if you say, on what the world could and would be, in color, for everyone. This helps me because I saw connections in the two sources I first chose that really related the hippie vibe into the 80's with rock and roll, and how in between these two eras how they combines in the 2000's.

**ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY #2:** Epstein, Dan. *20th Century Pop Culture: the 80s*.

Chelsea House, 2002.

**Summary:** This book by Dan Epstein, goes through the culture of the 80's. It goes through the art style, culture, television shows to music, and everything in between. The main ideas I spotted immediately were that is showed a lot of how the music was. It was grungy, mixed with a lot of cool jazz, and especially, rock and roll.

**Assessment:** It is somewhat useful, in a way, that helped me make connections from how the 60's were to the 80's, to now. I saw many connections involving the evolution of music, to art, and that sort. **ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY #3:** Wolfe, Tom. *The Electric Kool-Aid Acid Test*. Picador, 2008.

**Summary:** This book by Tom Wolfe goes through a test that brought the end of the 60's and the rise of the curling 70's. It includes the next research of what was thought of as "new journalism".

**Assessment:** It helps me put into perspective just how traumatic the 60-70's could have been for some people living in that time era. I can easily piece together how some would say that psychedelics played a large part in the making of the color schemes.

**ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY #4:** King, Stephen, and Górska Danuta. *Carrie*. Prószyński Media, 2013.

**ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY #5:** Hofstadter, Richard. *Anti-Intellectualism in American Life*. Vintage Books, 1991

**Summary:** "It is a rich, complex, shifting picture of the life of the mind in a society dominated by the ideal of practical success." --Robert Peel in the *Christian Science Monitor*. It focuses on a moral story based in the 60's through 70's of life and how it had drastically changed in many way throughout the two decades. It was known to be fact of non fiction many years after it was actually published, showing how this was a personal narrative about his neighbor and how his neighbor had grown up very different from the rest of the neighborhood for not having parents, but living with his grandparents.

**Assessment:** It was helpful to me by showing that not all decades were as understanding as the one we are living in right now. It brought eye opening key ideas that showed how people were even frowned upon for the way they dressed, and that showed to me that most people stuck with either really bright colors or really dark colors; and that you would NEVER mix them. I intend to try and include that in my works for my Mastery.

**Reflection:** As to my other annotated bibliographies; I just reflect on how everything I think will benefit me and help give more insight on why and how I intend to incorporate all of this into my works. This particular citation shows the hardship of the 60's and 70's, showing that not everything is always alright on the surface, and that could be the same for my works.

**ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY #6:** Kaufman, Sue, and Eeva Kilpi. *Kotirouvan Hupsu päiväkirja*. WSOY, 1973

**Summary:** When Bettina Balsler begins to suspect that she is going mad, she starts a secret diary as a form of therapy and as an escape from the boredom and dissatisfaction she experiences as a 1960s housewife. This is a narrative journal novel based on her experiences at home and what she went through before she slowly started to develop a mental disorder because of the way she was living.

**Assessment:** I am going to be using this one article of entry to be showing how; again, everything was not all “hippie vibes” and bright colors, but there was a much darker agenda on the houses and minds of the people who lived in this era. They continuously mention how it is important to keep black and white photography because it speaks to a certain audience of people as something greater than just snapping a photo. In this article, they countered how a photographer mentioned "It is Outdated and we do not see the world in black and white".

**Assessment:** I will use this information to perfect the art of my black and white photography, because I agree completely with their statement, saying "Clothing, color temperature differences in ambient light sources, cars and colorful background distractions have stopped being an issue. I still focus on my backgrounds, but I care more about the relationship between my subject and background, rather than a distracting color. It's freed up that part of my brain. Black and white allows you to begin to think about these key elements (lighting, composition, elements in and out of the frame) that you might otherwise not focus on as much when you're thinking about making colors work together, or pop".

**Reflection:** I will be trying to explain the art of simplicity within my works. I hope that the people who look at it also see the importance of the piece, and again, the simplicity of it, because as stated above, it is important for us as artists to see that clothing and colors cannot distract us from simple beauty.
